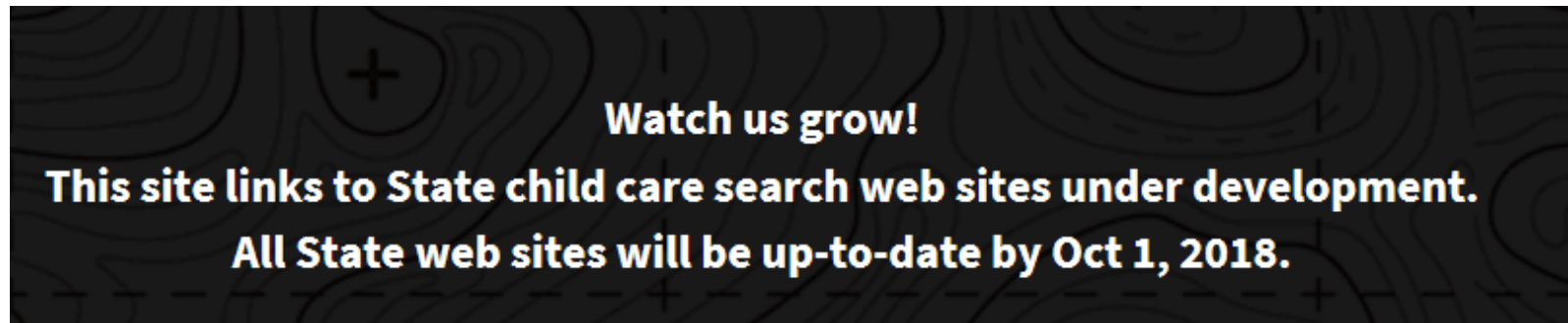

What is Regulated Child Care?

Regulated child care provides a foundation for safe child care settings by conducting background checks, regular inspections and complaint investigations. Types of regulated child care include:

- Certified Care (3 or fewer children under age 7 in care)
- Licensed Family Child Care (up to 8 children under age 7)
- Licensed Group Child Care (9 or more children under age 7)
- Day Camp (seasonal program for 4 or more children ages 3 & up)

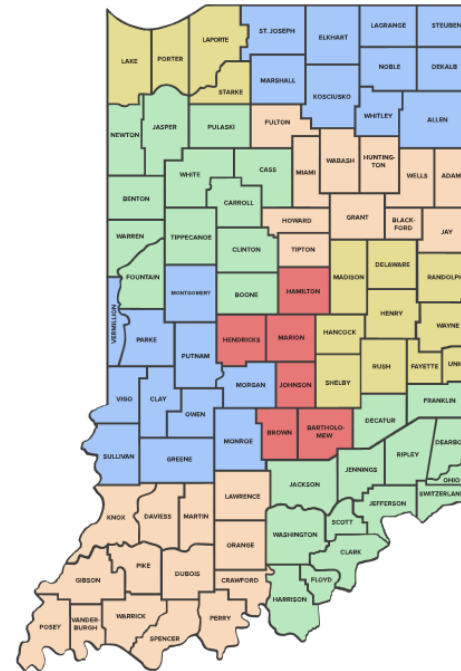
Indiana's child care resource and referral agencies provide services to families, child care providers and communities in these ways:

Important Information for Parents

In New Jersey, child care centers serving six or more children under the age of 13 must be licensed by DCF. A center becomes licensed after meeting all applicable conditions in the **[Manual of Requirements for Child Care Centers](#)**. Centers are licensed for a three-year period. A copy of the centers' license must be displayed in a prominent location at the center.

When parents register a child at a center, they must receive this **[Information to Parents](#)** document highlighting key information that must be made available, upon request, to parents about the center, including inspection and violation reports and a summary of any complaint made against the center. Centers are obligated to provide parents such information if requested. Therefore, going directly to your child care center for the information is the most efficient and effective approach to take.

DCF inspects centers every three years at the time of the center's renewal and conducts investigations when allegations are made about possible noncompliance with licensing requirements. Inspection reports are available at the center for parents to review. Click **[HERE](#)** to view the type of items DCF reviews during inspections.

Parents are encouraged to discuss with the center any questions or concerns they might have. Parents may also file or make a complaint with the OOL (877-667-9845) who will investigate. Complaints may be made anonymously. If there is a licensing complaint investigation, parents are entitled to review the OOL Complaint Investigation Summary Report, as well as any letters of enforcement or other actions taken against a center during its current licensing period.

Top ^ Under the provisions of the Manual of Requirements for Child Care Centers (N.J.A.C.10:122) every person or organization caring for six or more children below 13 years of age is required to secure a license from the Office of Licensing in the Department of Children and Families unless the program is exempt by law. Please refer to 10:122-1.2(d) for a list of these exemptions. Take these steps to start the licensing process: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Identify a potential site:<ul style="list-style-type: none">◦ Contact the construction official of the town or municipality, where the potential site is located, to determine if the property has been zoned to include a child care center;◦ Secure a variance (permission to operate a child care center in an area that is not approved for business use) from the municipal officials if the building is not in a business zone; and◦ Obtain a Certificate of Occupancy (CO) from the municipal construction official reflecting the building's compliance with applicable requirements of the State Uniform Construction Code (NJUCC). The CO must be one of the following use groups:<ul style="list-style-type: none">◦ I-4 (Institutional) for children younger than 2 ½ years of age;◦ E (Educational) for six or more children 2 ½ years of age or older; or◦ A-3 or A-4 (Assembly) for school aged child care programs (I-4 or E may also be used)<ul style="list-style-type: none">▪ The municipal zoning office or construction official can answer questions regarding a variance or a CO.

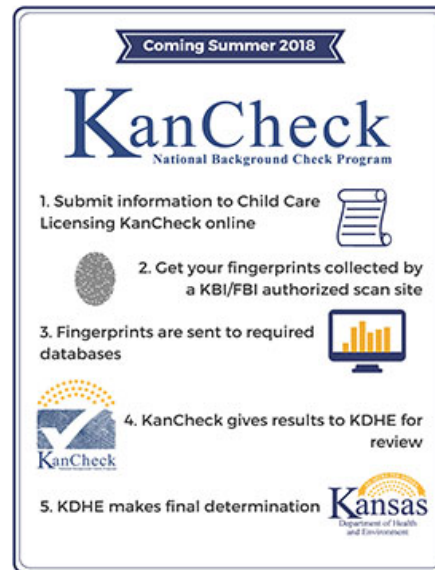

Kansas Child Care Licensing Program Background Check Requirements



General Questions Regarding Background Checks

Who is required to have background check?

Kansas law requires a background check for each individual residing, working or regularly volunteering in a licensed child care facility.

Background check requirements are protections intended to reduce the risk of abuse or neglect for children in regulated out-of-home child care settings. Parents need to be confident that individuals caring for their children do not have prior records of behavior that could endanger children.

What kinds of background checks are conducted?

Depending on the age of the individual and their role in the facility one of the following types of checks are conducted:

- ✓ *A comprehensive fingerprint-based check consisting of:*
 1. *A Federal Bureau of Investigation(FBI) fingerprint check;*
 2. *A search of the National Crime Information Center's National Sex Offender Registry; and*
 3. *A search of the following registries, repositories or databases in the state where the individual resides and each state where the individual has resided in the previous 5 years:*
 - a. *State criminal registry or repository;*
 - b. *State sex offender registry or repository; and*
 - c. *State-based child abuse and neglect registry and database.*
- ✓ *A name-based check consisting of:*
 1. *An adult and juvenile criminal records search of the Kansas Bureau of Investigation (KBI) database;*
 2. *A search of the Kansas Criminal Offender Registry; and*
 3. *A search of the Department for Children and Families Child Abuse and Neglect Registry.*

When will Kansas require comprehensive fingerprint-based background checks?

Kansas has until September 2018 to comply with the new federal requirements. The Child Care Licensing (CCL) Program

ACCIDENTS AND INCIDENTS

Safe center and residential child care settings provide ample opportunities for children to develop their social skills and to be empowered to solve problems while their working parents entrust them to their caregivers. Because of their natural curiosity and their developing brain and body, children will encounter situations that may cause them harm.

Some of the most common injuries in child care happen on the playground, because of loose and falling objects, or due to items and substances not properly stored. However, safe environments, appropriate ratios, and active supervision have proven to be paramount in preventing injuries.



Child Care Licensing has established rules to support caregivers in providing foundational health and safety measures. Child care providers are required to give parents a written report of every incident, accident, or injury involving their child and to report to Child Care Licensing any fatality and accidents that require medical attention. In the same way, parents should maintain an open communication with caregivers and keep an active initiative to help protect their children,

Child Care Licensing, child care providers, and parents must work together to protect children from undue harm.



- **What are the features?**
 - Parents and the public can view more information about child care facilities through the Summary of Facility Monitoring. The summary provides historical monitoring visits and compliance data for 36 months or less, depending on how long a child care facility has been licensed.
- **How do I access the summary?**
 - The summary is accessed through the [Child Care Locator](#). Simply enter selection criteria on the main page of the locator, choose the Search for Child Care button, and a list of facilities that match the criteria will display. Choose a facility and click the name or case number to access the summary.
- **What information will the summary tell me?**
 - The summary lists the facility's basic information, such as name, phone number, address and star status. It also lists the dates of monitoring visits, the purpose of the visit, and the areas of non-compliance observed.
- **What information will the summary tell me about licensing complaints?**
 - The summary shows the date, allegation and finding for all completed licensing complaints with substantial findings.

Are child welfare complaints shown on the summary?

- No. Oklahoma Child Care Services refers abuse/neglect allegations to DHS Child Welfare for screening and/or investigation. DHS Child Welfare will issue a summary of their findings to the facility within 60 days of acceptance. If confirmed, the facility is required to post the summary for 120 days and maintain a copy in their facility file for one year. A copy of this summary is in the public file kept at the Child Care Licensing Office.

What is a "Star Level"?

- The [Reaching for the Stars Program](#) has 4 levels of rating programs in which specified Differential Quality certification criteria must be met. A One Star program meets Oklahoma's minimum licensing requirements. A Three Star program meets higher national standards. Three Stars is the highest level. Child Care providers volunteer to make quality improvements above a One Star rating.
- Licensed programs operating year round receives a minimum of 3 unannounced monitoring visits per year. These visits determine compliance with minimum standards while Licensing staff are present and may also include monitoring for Reaching for the Stars criteria.

What is a non-compliance?


- A non-compliance identifies a violation of a licensing requirement.



The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) help pays the cooling bills of low-income and elderly people. People living in poverty and low-income elderly should not have to choose between having electricity in their homes and buying food for themselves and their families. Applicants must be 18 or older, the head household, and the holder of the utilities account. Residency requirements also apply. Applicants must provide a receipt for the utilities account, three latest check stubs for all working members of the household, and identification and all Social Security numbers for all household members. An applicant's utilities account must also have zero balance before applying. Eligibility is determined and benefits are provided for a period of three months, after which applicants are require to verify their continued eligibility before renewal.

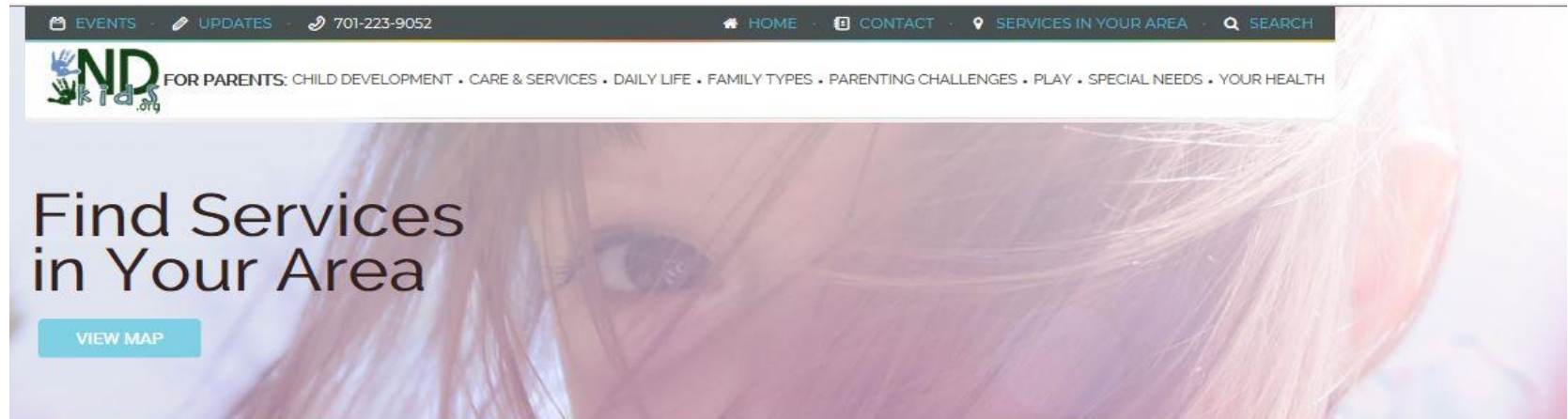

How do I know if my child is developing typically?

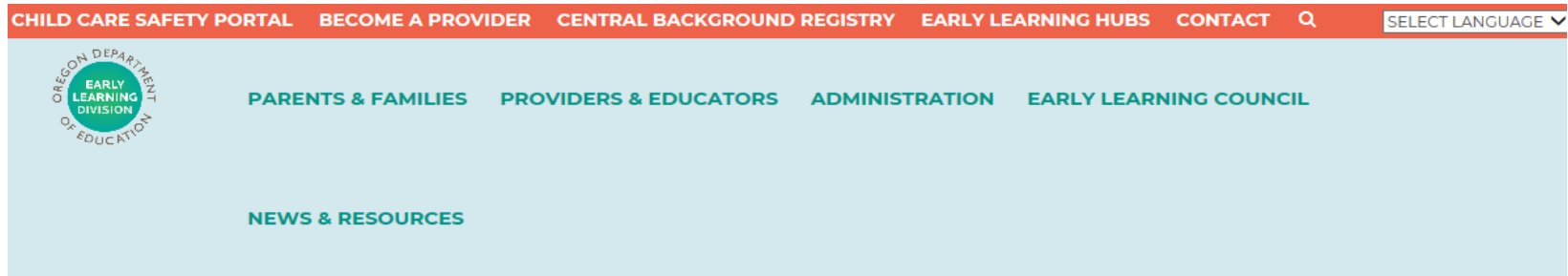
Children develop in similar patterns at similar times, and typically go through a sequence of accomplishments (crawl, stand, walk, run.) However, each child is unique and will therefore learn, grow and reach milestones according to their own timeline. Knowing when to be concerned and when not to be is important for parents and family members. Your child's pediatrician is your partner in determining whether or not your child is developing typically. 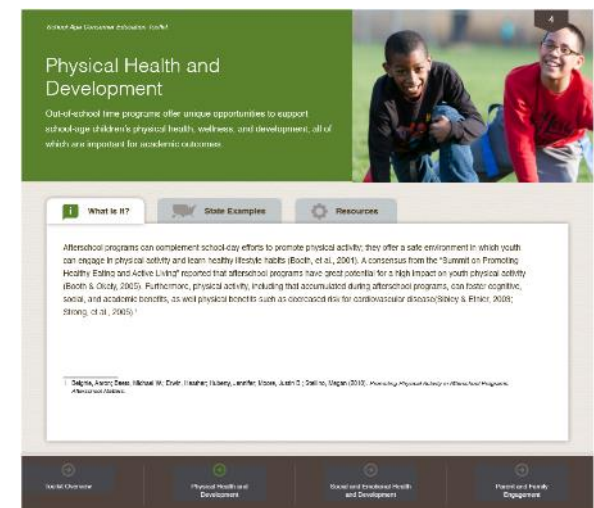

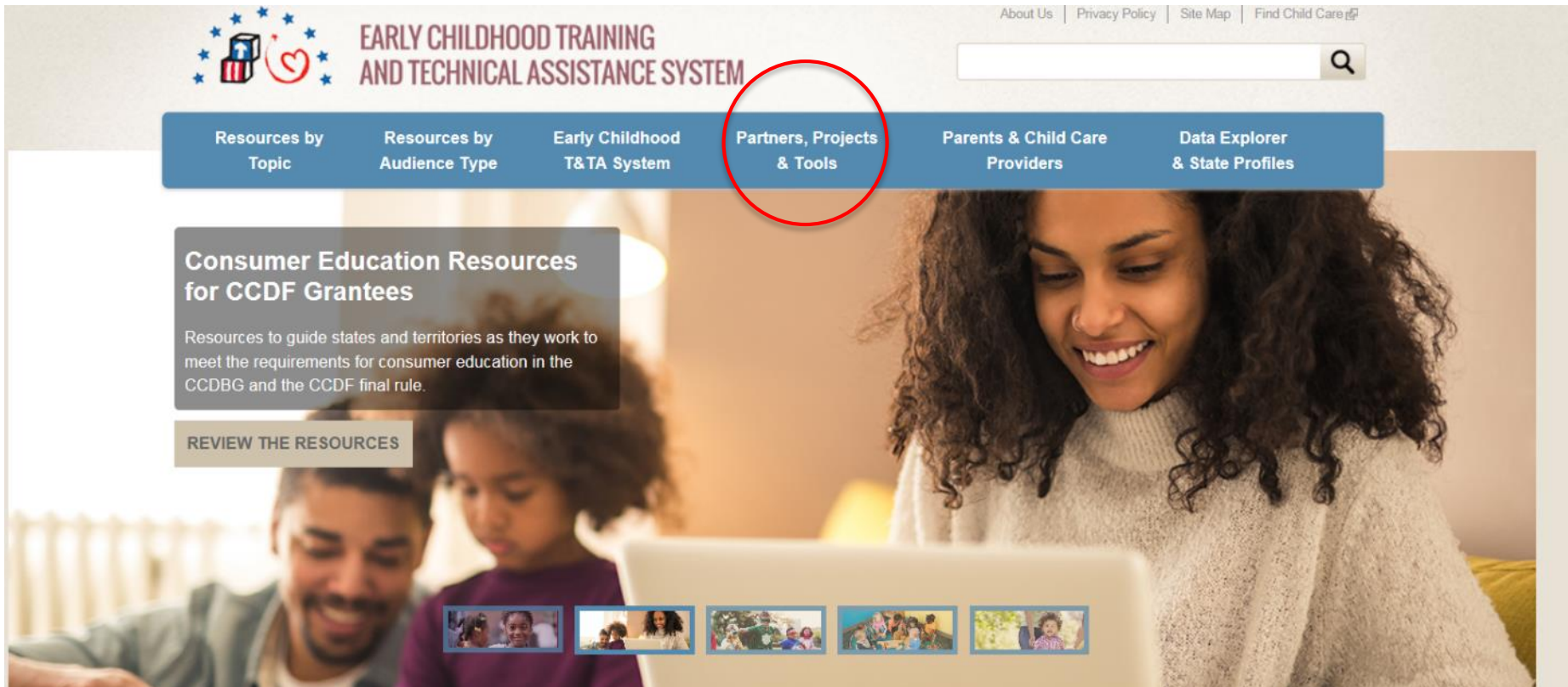
