

Plenary 3: Building a Visual Representation

Step 1: Identify who is going to be at the Center of your work. What result do you want to achieve for them?

This can be either a result for an entire tribal population or for your tribal agency or organization.

Step 2: Identify the partners that might contribute to your result.

- Think about partners that interact directly with children and families in your program or tribal community, as well as partners that work on a tribal, regional or national level.
- Feel free to add sectors that may not be included in the graphic.

Step 3: Identify the potential contributions each partner might make.

• Keep in mind we are just brainstorming and partners would identify their own contributions.

Step 4: Identify how you will measure the progress you are making.

- Remember the three key questions: How much will we do? How will we do it? What difference will it make?
- Consider the data that you are already collecting and reporting to the Office of Child Care.

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
