Infant/Toddler Specialist Network Defined

- An infant/toddler specialist network (ITSN) is a state-based (sometimes regionally managed) system that coordinates the work of infant/toddler specialists and is primarily funded through Child Care and Development Fund quality funding.
- The overall goal of an ITSN is to improve caregiver practices and increase the quality of each infant and toddler's developmental experience.

Stages of Implementation

- Emerging: Beginning to research and consider implementing an infant/toddler specialist network
- Installation: Beginning to find the needed resources to implement the infant/toddler specialist network
- Initial implementation: Beginning implementation of the infant/toddler specialist network

Stages of Implementation

- Full implementation: An infant/toddler specialist network has been fully implemented
- Full implementation and revision: As a result of continuous quality improvement and evaluation, a State may choose to revise or redesign its infant/toddler specialist network


